Snippets of Interest

NEW COMMUNITY SEED BANK

Gardeners! Allotment holders! Window box owners! Wild-patch people! Anyone with a few plant pots and an empty doorstep! Would you like FREE SEEDS to grow?

There is a newly-opened seed bank available to everyone in the local community. It is a very simple and free way of exchanging seeds. As well as money-saving and environmental benefits, there will be some seed varieties not usually available from garden centres and seed catalogues. Any seeds are suitable; garden flower, wildflower, vegetable, tree or shrub. Anyone can deposit seeds in the bank – it's very easy - just take them along in a small envelope that is suitably labelled. Perhaps a little useful information or handy tip might be worth adding, too. The more seeds in the bank, the more successful it will be. By mid-November, there should be a range of different seeds in the bank and withdrawals from the seed bank can begin. Anyone can withdraw seeds – it's easy and free. So where exactly is the seed bank? Well . . . it is in a very suitable place – being a bank that has deposits and withdrawals, has an annual [and biennial] growth rate, and hopefully generates a high rate of interest. The old HBG Co-op had a large wall safe in which to keep the day's takings and so on. The safe is still there, in the Hub, and in it you will find the seed bank – all safe and sound and hoping to add to growing and flowering in the local community.

Brampton and Fellside Repair Café

This is a new initiative to promote repair as an alternative to simply throwing things out. It is also an event intended to involve the whole community. We will be hosting regular Repair Café sessions at the Community Centre in Brampton beginning on 27 Aug and later at various satellite venues in Fellside Villages such as the Hallbankgate Hub. We would love to hear from anyone who can 'repair' or who enjoys 'mending' stuff and sharing knowledge' about ordinary household goods. We are also recruiting people to serve tea, coffee, cakes or who would simply like to help and be part of the community.

Something to think about

A QUESTION OF IDENTITY

Two thousand years ago a pious male Jew would daily thank God that he was not made a Gentile, a slave or a woman – categories of people who were debarred from certain religious privileges. The Apostle Paul, in his former life as 'Saul', a zealous Pharisee, would regularly have prayed such a prayer.

But after his Damascus Road conversion, he was renamed Paul. His new name signified a new identity conferred on him. He would later write:

There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female: for all of you are one in Christ Jesus.

For Paul these distinctions – *these identities* – are no longer definitive. Naturally they will still colour and effect our experience of life profoundly. And justice demands that all human beings should all be treated as equally valuable. But perhaps these identities are not actually the be-all and end-all of who we are at the deepest level.

God's giving of new names to so many characters in the Bible, to signify a new calling or a transformation in their lives, suggests that who we really are is hidden from us. Who we are is a secret, if you like, that only Christ knows. But he leads us towards our true identity if we are willing to be led.

I find this is exciting and liberating. It is mysterious. It does justice to our human dignity. And it does justice to Christ's initiative in defining our true identity.

Can human beings be freed from defining themselves in complacency and pride – or in confusion - or in victimhood? In faith can we be liberated by recognising that our true identity is a secret still to be revealed? As is our neighbour's? Perhaps such a realisation can help to keep us in humility, and to strengthen our proper reverence towards our own true selves and towards others'.


Shadowlands

A tale of a life from the Parish's past

This reports the death in 1933 of Margaret Park (nee Armstrong) at Roachburn Six cottages, who was born in 1850 at New Angerton, nr Greenhead. She lived to a then good age of 83. The obituary reads:

The village of Tindale has lost its oldest resident through the death of Mrs Margaret Park at the age of 83. She was born at Greenhead and moved to Roachburn aged 10 where she remained spending her whole life in the district.

She was a woman of a quiet, kindly disposition, always having been a hard working woman. Her people were the first and only tenants who have lived in the house in which she died at Roachburn. The funeral service was at Farlam on Saturday afternoon. The service was conducted by the Revd. T Smith. A short service was held at the residence conducted by Mr. C.T. Mitchelson. The hymn "Through all the Changing Scenes of Life" was sung.
